COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides an overview of Islam, including its beginnings and expansion, the beliefs and practices of formal and folk Islam, Islamic sects, the identity of women, Islam in the United States, global Islam today and bridges for communicating with Muslims.

COURSE PURPOSE:

This is the introductory course offered by AGTS in the topical area of Islamics. The course will enable students participate in an environment of ministry to Muslims by combining the following emphases:

- a.) rigorous academic information;
- b.) comparing Islamic and biblical beliefs and practices;
- c.) ministry applications in bringing the Gospel to Muslims; and
- d.) a pneumatological perspective on what the Holy Spirit is doing in our times.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:

A. Pre-Session

Read all the required textbooks listed above. The book reviews are due on Sunday, 7/1 at 11:59 pm (the day prior to the first day of class). They should be emailed to FarrokhF@evangel.edu. Late reviews will be penalized one letter grade per week late. Prepare a 500-word book review for each of the five required textbooks. Your review will be graded and should be organized into two parts:

- a. You are tasked by "Cliff's Notes" to provide a book summary for undergraduate students who do not know anything about this topic. Write a summary that describes the author's main point or points, even if the book is in testimony style.
- b. In your personal reflections, how can you apply the contents of this book to ministry to Muslims?

B. Session

1. Punctual attendance at all sessions is expected.
2. Students are expected to contribute verbally in each class.
3. A brief final exam will be given the last day of class. The exam will be true-false, multiple choice and fill-in-the-blank, and will be based solely on powerpoint material presented in class.

C. Post-Session

You will write a research paper following Turabian, *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, Eighth edition. The research paper will be 10 (ten) pages (at least) in length. Identity ONE "type" of Muslims from Part Five of the McCurry text (Sunnis, Shias, Sufis, Folk Muslims, Militants, Secularists, Ahmadiyya, or African-American Muslims). Your paper should answer the following questions:

- a. What are the demographics of this group? Where do they live, etc?
- b. What are the unique characteristics of the beliefs of this group as compared with other Muslims?
- c. How does Jesus meet the needs of this group?
- d. How would you train other Christians to reach out to this group?

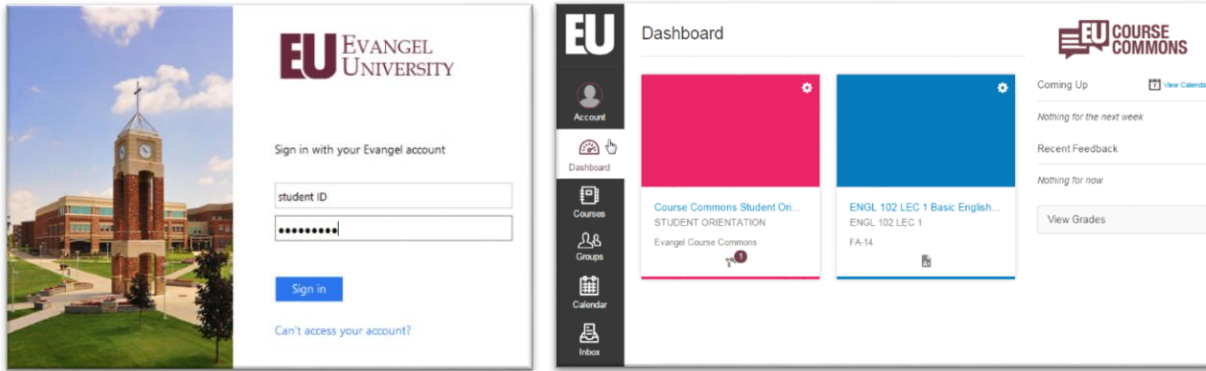

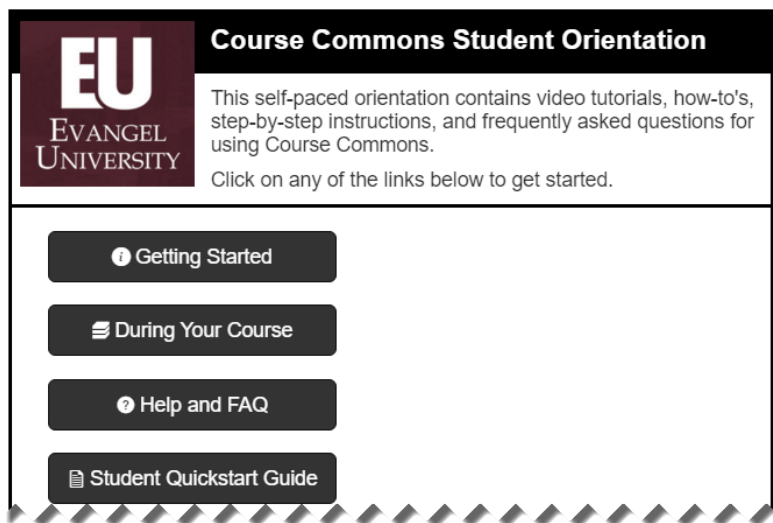

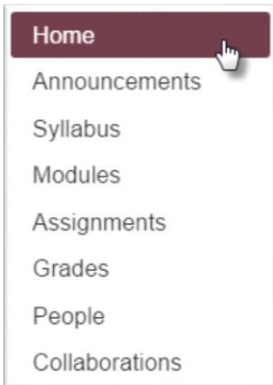
Accessing the Course in Course Commons

Access your courses list by clicking on the Courses icon on the Global Navigation menu on the left of the screen. You can also click on the course card on the Dashboard.

Students will have access to this course in Course Commons seven (7) days before the official beginning of the semester. After the end of the semester, students will have read-only access to the course through Course Commons. Only access to already submitted work, course resources and grades will be available.



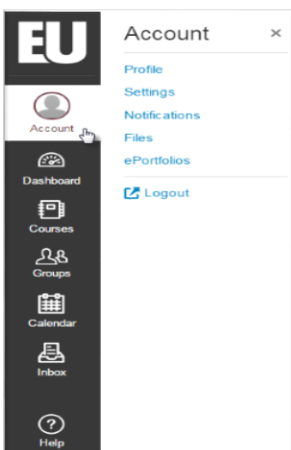
Accessing Course Content in Course Commons

The professor controls the availability of course content and features. Some items may be unavailable until a date set by the professor.

You can navigate the course content and features using the Course Navigation menu on the left. This menu can be customized by the professor, so it may differ from course to course, depending on what features the professor has chosen to make available.

You can collapse the Course Navigation menu to focus on the page content. Click on the menu icon in the upper left (which looks like 3 lines). You can expand the menu by clicking on the menu icon again.

All course content (syllabus, modules, course materials, assignments, online quizzes, online discussions, grades, etc.) can be accessed using the links in the Course Navigation menu.



Personal Settings in Course Commons

Students can adjust their personal settings in Course Commons. Click on the Account icon to access the Account menu.

On the **Profile** page, you can add a profile picture to your account. You can also edit your display name, which will show to your instructor and peers throughout Course Commons.

The **Settings** link allows you to add additional contact methods (personal email or cell phone number for text message alerts) to your account. You can also add external services, like Twitter, Skype or Google Drive.

The **Notifications** link allows you to customize *what* notifications you receive from Course Commons and *how* and *when* you receive them. This is a student-centered feature that allows you to optimize your notifications to help you stay connected to what is happening in all your courses.

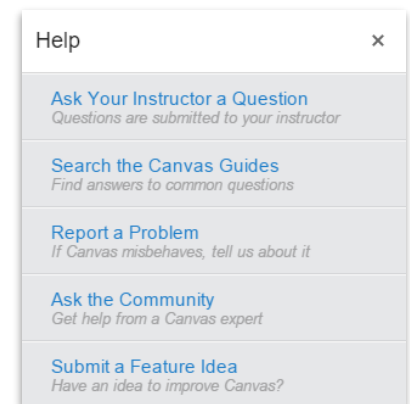
How to Get Help with Course Commons
