CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

MCC 554 Folk Islam and Power Encounter

A study of the development of popular Islam within the world of official Islam, emphasizing an understanding and analysis of the felt needs of ordinary Muslims. Special attention will be given to the role of spiritual power encounter as a tool in evangelizing Muslims.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

MCC 545 Introduction to Islam

This course provides an overview of Islam, including its beginnings and expansion, the beliefs and practices of formal and folk Islam, Islamic sects, the identity of women, Islam in the United States, global Islam today and bridges for communicating with Muslims.

COURSE PURPOSE:

Folk or Popular Islam, within the world of official Islam, emphasizes an understanding and practice of spiritual power for ordinary Muslims. The majority of the Muslim world practice Folk Islam. Special attention will be given to the role of spiritual power encounter as a tool in evangelizing Muslims.

Why are students taking this course? How will it prepare them for the future?

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Daily attendance at all classes.
- 2. A signed statement that all reading assignments have been done.
- 3. A one-to-two page response paper to be handed in at the beginning of days 2, 3,4, and 5, based on the previous day's material.
- 4. (For MAs) Two book reviews of five full pages each on two of the required textbooks. For BAs, one book review of five pages.
- 5. (For the PhDs) Two book reviews of five full pages each from the MA required list of books and one from the PhD required list.
- 6. (For the MAs) A ten-page paper on a theme to be chosen in consultation with the Professor that is of interest to the student in his or her present situation or anticipated field situation.
- 7. (For the PhDs) A full, fifteen-page paper will be written on a subject chose in consultation with the Professor that is germane to the current or anticipated field work of the student.
- 8. On the last hour of class, each student will be asked to write a three page summary of what he or she thinks were the most helpful elements of the class and homework experiences. This may be done on a computer or hand-written. If the student cares to do this ahead of time and hand it in at the time of the class, then there will be oral discussion with the professor on what was turned in.

ATTENDANCE:

Class attendance is extremely important to your success as a student. - 1. To frame the course in the setting of a Biblical worldview that includes the material on the war in heaven, Satan's role in the world, the role of demons and the occult practices prohibited in the Scriptures.
- 2. To awaken the Christian Worker to the popular occult practices that are pervasive throughout the Muslim world.
- 3. To learn how Jesus Christ answers each one of these felt needs that lead the Muslims to turn to the occult for help in answering these perceived needs.
- 4. To highlight the role of deliverance and healing ministries in working with Muslims as we find them in everyday situations.
- 5. Renunciation of all evil practices and attitudes. Building the life on the foundation of the Scriptures and life in the Spirit.

COURSE OUTLINE:

- A thorough tour of that aspect of a Biblical worldview that includes material on Satan, Demons, and occult practices that are mentioned throughout the Scriptures.





ACCESSING THE COURSE IN COURSE COMMONS

Access your courses list by clicking on the Courses icon on the Global Navigation menu on the left of the screen. You can also click on the course card on the Dashboard.


To customize your Courses list, see the following Help Guide: How do I customize my Courses list?

Students will have access to this course in COURSE COMMONS seven (7) days before the official beginning of the semester. Students have until seven (7) days after the semester begins to complete financial registration. If financial registration is not completed by the seventh day, course access will be revoked.

After the end of the semester, students will have read-only access to the course through COURSE COMMONS. Only access to already submitted work, course resources and grades will be available.

ACCESSING COURSE CONTENT IN COURSE COMMONS

The professor controls the availability of course content and features. Some items may be unavailable until a date set by the professor.

You can navigate the course content and features using the Course Navigation menu on the left. This menu can be customized by the professor, so it may differ from course to course, depending on what features the professor has chosen to make available.

You can collapse the Course Navigation menu to focus on the page content. Click on the menu icon in the upper left (which looks like 3 lines). You can expand the menu by clicking on the menu icon again.

All course content (syllabus, modules, course materials, assignments, online quizzes, online discussions, grades, etc.) can be accessed using the links in the Course Navigation menu. Students can adjust their personal settings in COURSE COMMONS. Click on the Account icon to access the Account menu.

On the **Profile** page, you can add a profile picture to your account. You can also edit your display name, which will show to your instructor and peers throughout COURSE COMMONS.

The **Settings** link allows you to add additional contact methods (personal email or cell phone number for text message alerts) to your account. You can also add external services, like Twitter, Skype or Google Drive.

The **Notifications** link allows you to customize what notifications you receive from COURSE COMMONS and how and when you receive them. This is a student-centered feature that allows you to optimize your notifications to help you stay connected to what is happening in all your courses.


HOW TO GET HELP WITH COURSE COMMONS
