### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

1. Bring your Greek NT to every class. We will **sight-read/translate in class** without aids.
2. Complete all **syntax worksheet** assignments. The worksheets are on Course Commons.
3. Punctually **attend VRC class** and participate in class discussions on exegetical outlines/structure diagrams, translation and syntactical analysis of the assigned passages from First Peter.
4. Create your own **verb syntax chart** defining the major usages of tense, voice, and mood.
5. Create a list of **Textual Criticism terms** and define them as you read Metzger's *The Text of the New Testament*.
6. Develop your Greek vocabulary by taking **quizzes**. Proctors are required to submit your quiz.
7. Write a major **exegetical paper**. Details are given during weeks 10-15.
